

Self Development of People Sunday

In Matthew 25, Jesus asks his disciples the profound question "where have you seen me?" In doing so, Jesus makes a statement about the importance of being able to see that God has a preferential option and redeeming love for the poor. As disciples of Jesus Christ, Matthew 25 also shows us that we are implored to recognize that Jesus' ministry was one of anti-poverty in which he promoted justice, encouraged the building of relationships and established economic equity. These are also the pillars on which Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People (SDOP) stand. On **April 7th** we celebrate Self Development of People Sunday as part of our One Great Hour of Sharing collection. Below is one of several stories of God in action.

Presbyterian Committee on the Self-Development of People partners with Detroit youth collective

Stitching up Detroit is a youth-run screen print and graphic design collective that helps provide a source of income to students. The project does live screen printing events. Project members developed workshops for the Detroit-based nonprofit Alternatives For Girls and four Detroit public schools, which resulted in participants each printing their own designs on T-shirts.

FACT Stitching up Detroit includes a one-year training program for middle and high school students in graphic design, textile design and screen printing. After completing the training program, young people are able to receive FACT apprenticeships with the Stitching up Detroit Cooperative.

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A Posting from the Pastor

Once again, we find ourselves in the 'almost' position: winter is *almost* over (officially its been spring for more than a week now), spring is *almost* here. Lent is *almost* finished (though we have three weeks left), Easter is *almost* here. I'm taking my snow tires off this week; others will wait until the threat of snow is completely gone. Gardeners can't wait to get their hands in the soil; snow shovels won't be retired just yet. Only X number of days of denying yourself whatever has been given up for Lent; the Easter Egg hunt has the team of helpers cruising toward the celebration of the Son rise.

In WELLSPRINGS, a book of guided meditations by Anthony de Mello, a Jesuit priest, includes one called 'The Redemption'. He asks: <u>What does it mean to be truly alive?</u> Over the next two pages, he answers that question in a rather simple (though not simplistic) way. One thing is certain: to be fully alive involves the renunciation of one's past and one's future. He addresses his reasons by describing how each of these practices rob us of life.

I therefore let go of my yesterdays, my propensity for living in the past. One way of living in the past is holding on to grievances...I make a list of people I resent, offering each an amnesty. The absolution will not come if I feel they alone are guilty, I am blameless. I must see myself as being co-responsible...He/She was an instrument used by God to bring me grace, as Judas was an instrument used by God to bring grace to humanity and Jesus Christ.

If I mean to give up living in the past, I must drop regrets as cleanly as I drop resentments. What I tend to look upon as loss ... I must learn to see as blessings. For in the dance of life all things cooperate to do us good. Having let go of resentments and regrets I also let go of my good experiences which, like worldly goods, can be accumulated – and if I cling to them, I shall once again be living in the past.

I have let go of my yesterdays. I have still to dispossess myself of my tomorrows...So I renounce my greed and all ambition to acquire, to achieve, to become somebody in the future. Life is not tomorrow, life is now. I push them all away. A blessed relief, for when I drop my greed, I drop my bondage to anxiety and am freed to be alive.

I come into the present to experience life as it is now, for eternal life is now, eternal life is here: I listen to the sounds around me...I become aware of my breathing in and out and of my body so as to be as fully present as I can.

In the days of this month, this Lent, this spring, this Easter, God invites us not to be almost people, people possessed by the past, people poised to find tomorrow's treasure. This is the moment that matters most. See what a difference this can make, for it will surely slow us down to the speed of now; or as the Psalmist proclaimed: **This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.**
