Last Minute Shop



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A Posting from the Pastor

2014 was a devastating year for the congregation of Trinity Reformed UCC and for me as their pastor. Fourteen active members of the church died during that year. The loss took from us regular worshippers, helpers in the kitchen, singers in the choir, Sunday School teachers, members of the Consistory, a mom in her mid-forties who helped her daughter pick out her wedding gown for a service her mom would not attend. You can imagine how it felt as news of one death was followed by another...and another.

I suggested we hold a 'Blue Christmas' service on a Sunday afternoon in mid-December. No, we didn't listen to Elvis singing about his 'blue' Christmas though his point was well-made: grief pays no attention to holidays or birthdays, anniversaries or celebrations. Indeed, for the first year after the death of a dear one, special times carry a poignancy as her or his chair sits empty and memories of past times come rushing in bringing sadness and longing into the room.

The service was intended for anyone in the church (or community) who was feeling a lack of holiday spirit, for whom depression had become a companion, who wanted a break from all the 'ho-ho-ho' activities and the constant blaring of holiday cheer. Obviously, I had in mind the families from Trinity who had been caught in the web of loss and loneliness but others came as well.

I believe about fifteen persons attended. One was a woman from Wilkes-Barre who happened to see our ad in the local paper. She came in the door almost an hour before the service started, weeping as she came up the steps. Her son had died that year and the wounds were fresh. Pappy had lost his wife, Glen his mother, Becca her mother. Sitting on the altar table were blue candles – one for each of the fourteen souls who wouldn't be part of the Christmas Eve candle-lighting that year. Additional candles were available for people like our guest – all given the opportunity to take their candle home.

We sang, we prayed, we read scripture, we sat in holy silence watching the flickering candles, and we shared stories that brought back laughter and smiles. God was so very present. After singing 'Silent Night', I read these lines of a blessing written by Jan Richardson:

This blessing does not mean to take the night away but it knows its hidden roads, knows the resting spots along the path, knows what it means to travel in the company of a friend. So when this blessing comes, take its hand. Get up.

Set out on the road you cannot see. This is the night when you can trust that any direction you go, you will be walking toward the dawn.

Please be mindful in these weeks of your own sadness from whatever would steal your joy. Notice those around you for similar signs. Be a friend where you can. Send a thoughtful card. Pray for people everywhere whose journey to Bethlehem is complicated, even crushing. Give the gift that matters above all others: love.

Lastly, share the meaning and beauty of God's coming into this world however you can and may Christmas be filled with blessings, gratitude and joy. Join us if you can on Christmas Eve, as we light the candles of hope and hold them high. O come, o come, Emmanuel!

New Opportunities for Romanian Orphaned Children

Dear Faithful Friends of NOROC,

I had the great joy this past June to return to Tulcea where I had been the PC(USA) Mission Co-Worker serving NOROC from 2001-2011. I was eager to see firsthand what was happening with NOROC's mission with the institutionalized young people in Tulcea County today.

We are still led by our beloved founder and President of NOROC, Professor Petru Solca. For most of these children, Petru is their only father figure. Mrs. Marilena Solca continues to oversee our educational programs as our NOROC team in Tulcea faces new challenges.

Immediately after we arrived, Petru Solca took us to NOROC's Thursday evening Bible Study. I felt at home again! There were many new young faces. One beaming young man grabbed me in a bear hug. "Ms. Mary, do you remember me?", he squealed. It was Mamut! Mamut was just a baby at the maternal center in Babadag in 2001 when I first arrived in Tulcea. His mother could not keep him, but our Big Hearted Grannies loved him as a baby, our Big



Hearted Teachers helped him through school, our Big Hearted Friends ^{The Reunion: Mamut and I} provided social opportunities to prepare him for his future. Now, our spiritual programs are molding him into a beautiful, loving, young man.



Thursday Night Bible Study

NOROC's Bible Study leader, Mr. Andrei, is wonderful. His day job is as a social worker in the crisis center. He was trained as a priest but felt God's call for him to work directly with at-risk youth. For me, our evening worship is the most important aspect of NOROC's mission. To know these kids are being fed spiritually by such a fine person means I can enjoy my retirement knowing there are many good shepherds looking after our "flock".

I want to emphasize our NOROC horse therapy camp. I met Daniel, a very lethargic 9-year-old, at the maternal center where a "Big Hearted Granny" watches babies while mothers learn job skills. His mother was temporarily living there after escaping a terrible life. Surrounded by babies, Daniel seemed depressed and bored, so I received permission for him to attend the NOROC horse camp the following week.

Twenty-six children learned to groom, take care of, and ride horses. Daily horse and carriage rides, a cookout, and crafts made this a special week for everyone. After a week of fun outdoors, Daniel was transformed into a funny, energetic, and happy little boy! This was only *one* week of NOROC's extensive summer program of day camps, excursions, crafts, outside play, swimming, and so much more.

New Opportunities for Romanian Orphaned Children

Now and in the next few years, NOROC will continue its mission despite new challenges. All institutions as we have known them are being closed by 2022, yet the high number of abandoned children in Romania remains the same 20 years later. Some children will be scattered throughout remote villages with little access to education past 4th grade. What does the future hold for these children without education? Will there be enough foster families? Where will the babies be sent?

One thing is guaranteed: NOROC will transform as needed to meet the needs of each abandoned, abused, or traumatized child, wherever they may be. This means a newer, bigger van to reach these children and continued financial support for our growing programs.

To say my visit was highly emotional is an understatement. I left Romania knowing full well that NOROC continues keeping on keeping on. Regardless of the challenges, NOROC follows the mandate of Jesus, "I am not willing for even one of these little ones to be lost." We need your prayers and support now more than ever
