

World Communion Sunday

On World Communion Sunday, we celebrate our oneness in Christ with our brothers and sisters around the world. It's perhaps the most appropriate day of the year to receive the Peace & Global Witness Offering — to think about what it means to be peacemakers, to be witnesses and advocates for compassion, peace and justice. To seek "peace in all times in all ways" (2 Thess. 3:16). Celebration of World Communion Sunday, as it was originally known, was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church in 1936. Churches in other denominations were invited to celebrate with us, extending the celebration to a large number around the world. World Communion Sunday is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger ecumenical Church, and today it is being celebrated around the world by many denominations. Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, invites us to the table. It is a big table and we share it with many. We share our table with those around the nation and the globe who are united in their belief that a culture of rape is not acceptable. Our Peace & Global Witness Offering supports a multitude of ministries and programs on the local and national level to address the fact that one in every three women has suffered gender-based violence. We share our table with those who are currently incarcerated, and those who were previously incarcerated. Congregations and mid councils around the nation are choosing to use their share of the Peace & Global Witness Offering to help lift up those who seek a better path. We share our table with those seeking refuge and reconciliation arising from conflict. Our Peace & Global Witness Offering allows many to work for Christ's peace on local and regional levels, as well as to extend their witness to more distant and war-torn places. We share our table. We open our doors. We answer God's call, expressed in 2nd Thessalonians, to seek "peace, at all times in all ways." And we do this with open hearts. We do it together. On World Communion Sunday, please think about all those with whom we share our table — with all those with whom we share a commitment to "peace at all times, in all ways." Please give generously to the Peace & Global Witness Offering. For when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.

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A Posting from the Pastor

A friend called me yesterday afternoon. She is in her early 70's with striking short white hair, which I mention because she was calling from the BU campus. She takes one or two classes each semester, auditing them, always finding herself surrounded by students fifty years younger. On this day when the sun was bright and the day warm, she realized she was thirst so she walked over to the student union to buy a bottle of water. As she set the bottle down on the counter, she discovered she'd left her purse in her car, a hike from where she was at the time. The counter person made no effort to offer any assistance but from across the room, a young man came over and said 'Put it on my card.' With a smile, he turned and went back to his seat.

Sandy was touched by his action, as you can imagine. His compassion – and I use that word intentionally – moved her more than the relief that water would give her. She called me because she said 'I've just got to tell someone about this.' The unexpected act of generosity, caring, simple courtesy has that affect. What I know is that she will never forget what he did, although he may not give it a second thought.

We've come to call this 'paying it forward' (the name of a terrific movie from where the movement caught its spark). Liberty Mutual Insurance – before they fell into the pit of having an emu help push their product – had several commercials showing individuals noticing the kindness of others and imitating it for someone else. I was quite taken by the creative and practical message it offered.

For us, of course, this is Christianity 101: love your neighbor as yourself. Loving our neighbor (caring about their welfare, putting ourselves in their shoes, going the extra mile, risking our own plans, money, time to ease their pain) needs only our paying attention. Knowing we can't help everyone doesn't mean we can help this person. I doubt the young man was sitting waiting for this opportunity and there wasn't time for him to have an inner debate: a need called for action, something he could do.

Whether he did this from purely Christian motives is not the point; he did what a room full of people could have done, including the woman at the cash register. We've all likely talked ourselves out of a similar action, weighing the pros and cons until the moment passed us by. But I'm pretty sure we've seen and responded, sometimes motivated by a feeling and sometimes without thinking.

In these tenuous times where measuring everyone by the size of their red or blue hat, what the world needs now is still love, sweet love. Simple kindness. An extra zero behind a check to the Red Cross. Putting our phone down long enough to scan the room. Asking God as we start each day to give us eyes to see, hearts to care and hands to reach out. Doesn't matter if the recipient is our wife or husband or parent, a neighbor or coworker, a stranger, someone with whom we have nothing in common. I guarantee you, to act on another's behalf will bring more healing and hope in their life that we can imagine.

That's Job One for you and me, followers of the Risen Christ, member of the human family, God's hands and feet on this planet. Join me for worship this month, beginning with World Communion Sunday, where we can reorient ourselves to our calling.
